aesthetic practice nurtured over the last 28 years.

Kowalke's classical training in Renaissance style drawing continues to integrate with his innovative and bold use of new mediums. In these paintings the use of fabric dyes, pure pigments, and metallic dust create a rich surface alight with saturated color and optical flecks which can only be seen while witnessing the originals in person.

Also evident is Kowalke's exploration of composition and color acknowledging past modern masters such as Chagall, Gauguin, Van Gogh, Franz Marc and Milton Avery. Complementary color play, reductionist modeling of form and compositions referring to Japanese woodblock prints reveal Kowalke's homage to these modern masters.

The artist has a deep and committed relationship with the land and various cultures of Hawaii. Having grown up in Kailua, Oahu, he spent much of his time in the ocean and exploring the forests of the windward side. The natural beauty and melting-pot history of Hawaii is essential to his artwork.

Kowalke is committed to art, not only as a livelihood and personal journey, but as a tool for teaching children and uniting local communities, he said.

Five years ago, Kowalke and a board of trustees created a company called "Art In Sight," devoted to the integration of art, science

"Art In Sight" has to this date completed five major art installations around the island of Hawaii. Young students and community members work together learning local ecology, history, culture, science and communication skills, as they create public works of art. Each project and its resulting artwork emphasize the island eco-

systems and a holistic psychology based in the belief of "interconnectedness."
